

Both ceremonies will last roughly two hours. No tickets are required. These are open seating events. Gates open to the public approximately one hour before each procession begins. There is ample seating for families and other guests in the stands and on the field.

Webster CSD was well represented at the National Technical Honor Society Induction Ceremony on May 24. Forty-six of the EMCC students who were inducted were from Webster high schools.

The Women in Computing at Cornell High School Programming Contest, held concurrently at Cornell University in Ithaca and in New York City, includes an introduction to programming contest strategy and logistics, followed by a two-hour online contest of teams of two to three students. Webster Schroeder High School's two teams were Holly Fici, Jessica Fetter, and Akshaya Dasaraju, and David Young, Yi Jiang, and Filipe Feijao. Webster Thomas High School's team was made up of Ella Esders and Jenna Dow. All of the Webster students competed at the Ithaca location, where Young, Jiang, and Feijao took first place for that site.

On March 23, Webster Schroeder and Webster Thomas students participating in Webster YEA! pitched their business ideas to local investors. The One Webster Saunders Scholarship winner was **Jacqueline Herrmann** for her business Prelude. Runner up was **Cameron Gunther** for her business Jewelry by Cam. Each of these young entrepreneurs was awarded \$950 for their company.

Webster Thomas art students **Gretchen Coffed** and **Ella Hamby** are national Silver
Key recipients in the annual Scholastic Art and
Writing Awards. Coffed won for her chalk pastel
drawing "In My Room" while Hamby won for

Four One Webster high school students have been honored by the National Center for Women and Information Technology. 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Summer Free Meal Availability

Summer is coming soon. Some Webster CSD families may be thinking about what their students will do for meals while school is out. The good news is that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has partnered with Greece CSD to serve FREE meals to students throughout Monroe County at English Village Elementary School, 800 Tait Avenue. Meals will be served Monday-Friday, July 5-August 18; breakfast is 8:00-9:30 a.m. and lunch is 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m.

There are no income requirements and no registration necessary. The Summer Food Program is fully funded by the USDA. Any child 18 and younger is eligible to participate. Meals must be eaten on site. Transportation will not be provided. For more information call 1-866-3HUNGRY.
